Designated in 1934, Daisetsuzan National Park is Japan's largest mountain national park at around 230,000 hectares. The park features stunning landscapes ranging from majestic mountains to beautiful wetland, and was designated to protect the unspoiled nature and precious flora and fauna, including species that can only be found in this area.

It is our duty and our right to preserve these magnificent natural landscapes and the flora and fauna that live there for future generations, and to nurture the life in the Daisetsuzan mountains to enable further growth. Treating nature with respect is of the utmost importance when enjoying a park like this.



#### **Sounkyo Visitor Center**

Sounkyo Visitor Center is a one-stop facility to help you explore the nature in Daisetsuzan National Park. We give nature talks, lead nature experiences, carry out various activities to preserve the natural environment and provide the latest information on Sounkyo and the Daisetsuzan area.

#### Vast fields of flowers

High altitudes create another world-venture up the Daisetsuzan mountains and you'll see flower fields and alpine butterflies that can't be found closer to sea level. This exhibit tells you everything you need to know about the windswept earth, Siberian dwarf pine forests, snowy fields and wetlands created by late-melting snow in the upper reaches of the mountains, and the plants and butterflies found there.

#### **G** Columnar joints

Ohachidaira Caldera, the caldera in the center of the park, was formed by an eruption around 30,000 years ago. During the eruption, a large amount of volcanic ash and small stones filled the watershed of the Ishikari River. As this sediment cooled, orderly cracks called columnar joints were formed. Over the centuries, the fierce current of the Ishikari River wore these down, creating the gorge you see today.








#### A VR Monitor System

#### **C** Topographical diorama

This diorama shows the topography of the Daisetsuzan mountains. See a bird's eye view of the main mountains, trails, emergency cabins, campgrounds and hot springs, along with snowy ravines that can be seen as late as early July.
